Last month we remembered the first La Posada once more, the journey of Joseph and "great with child" Mary from the northern village of Nazareth down south to the Judean hills and the village of Bethlehem, only to find upon arriving, there was no room for them in the Inn. Christian folk often reenact this search for lodging among their church communities. The journey continues.

Perhaps you journeyed to relatives or friends for Christmas or New Year's but undoubtedly your journey was a lot less taxing than the trek Joseph and pregnant Mary made 2000 years ago. Prompted by a decree from Caesar that their taxes were due and payable in the village of Joseph's lineage, Bethlehem, the couple made their 65 mile journey through some rugged terrain on foot. Ι know a donkey is always seen in all the storybooks and movies, but no such beast of burden is mentioned in the Gospel of Luke's Christmas account in the second chapter of Luke. Today a trip of that length would take us about an hour. Joseph and Mary probably took at least three days to accomplish the journey. They slept on the ground along the way and bedded down in a stable that first Christmas Eve. Sometime during that first holy night, Mary, without the assistance of a friend, relative or midwife, gave birth to her first newborn Son, Jesus our Lord and Savior. The journey continues.

This month we follow the Star of Bethlehem once more in this glorious season of Epiphany. We remember, on January 6, the journey of those first magi as they traversed over field and mountain to complete their search for the promised Child. This, too, was a rugged journey unlike our more comfortable jaunts today. And once there, they presented the newborn King with their treasures of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The journey continues.

mothers.



The Church Upgrade Fundraising Project Update


Wow! Look at what we've done as we end the 2005 calendar year. 50 families have contributed or pledged to buy one or more square yard of carpet, a new sanctuary chair, or a stained glass window. There are only eight chairs left to sell and 155 yards of carpet. The stained glass was sold out on the first day of the campaign.

We are humbled at the generous response and outpouring of love and dedication each family has shown for this project. We will continue this project until March 1st 2006, but there isn't much left.

The great news was we had enough surplus left from our building debt fundraising of last spring to cover the lack of response to our monthly debt payment as we closed out the year. If this generous support continues we are not planning to have any other fundraisers this spring.

We hope this type of support will allow us to continue to improve the landscaping needed on the outside as we beautify the interior of our church with carpet, chairs, and stained glass.

The carpet and chairs should be installed before we have our congregational meeting and elections on January 29, 2006. The stained glass is planned to be installed before Easter on April 16th.
