These are exciting times for our church family. It is the anticipation of what is happening to our family of believers as we welcome our new pastor and refocus on what Christ is calling us to do. This anticipation has been bolstered by a great year under the interim leadership of Pastor Kenneth followed by the blessing of one very special Pastor Chuck. Yes, we are blessed by all the good that is going on in our congregation. We are surely trying to live our new mission statement of "inviting all to grow in Christ".

We have had a **transition team** that did a great job in building our church profile and a **call committee** that has been working feverishly since last January to find the right shepherd for our flock. These two teams were very important to our future but they are by design, only temporary. The rest of the blessings are all the people who dedicate themselves to **assisting with worship** throughout the year and **supporting the Lord's work** in every way they can.

The one area of **concern** is our lack of support of our building fund. We have over a \$10,000 **deficit** so far this year. The payments have been made each month but we had to draw money from other accounts to make up that deficit. Money designated to the building fund can only be used to pay our mortgage, which is now below \$500,000. We can draw money from the general fund to help meet our payments BUT, this is not good business and we do not like to do this. We have around 60 giving units in our congregation and simple math would say that if each gave \$20 a week to the building fund we would not have a deficit. Not everyone is able or willing to do this so others have to give more. There are many who give of their "time and talent" to offset their lack of "treasure" and this is needed as well. We have decided to take a second offering on the last Sunday of each month just for our building fund. It should help all of us be more aware.

We look forward to this fall and holiday season. We can be sure the anticipation is doing what Christ would have us do as we are led by the Holy Spirit.

Not just for youth

How does youth ministry fit into the ministry of our whole congregation? Our church is one of the few places today where generations have an opportunity to interact, where values can be taught and modeled, and where an individual is valued as a gift to the community. This is not random or accidental that this is so, since community and relationship is at the very heart of our values. These realities of community and relationship should be at the core of our congregation's ministry as it relates to the youth and families of our community.

Youth ministry is no longer simply a "youth group". The emphasis of an integrated youth ministry is one that honors each young person's baptismal calling and our own Lutheran understanding of the body of Christ. I believe the church can no longer afford to put young people out of sight and out of mind to be handled by a "youth worker" and a few fundraisers. The church of tomorrow is being built on the foundation we are laying today, and we are laying that foundation on the hearts of our young people. We know what happens to houses built on sand, don't we?

Ask yourself these questions:

- 1. To what degree is our youth ministry integral to our congregation's ministry?
- 2. How many young people do I greet by name on Sunday morning?
- 3. How many other adults do the same?
- 4. Are young people asked to serve based on their individual gifts?
- 5. How do we honor parents and parenting in our congregation?
- 6. Does our church budget reflect an interest and priority in youth?
- 7. Are relationships being built intentionally between youth and healthy, caring adults?
- 8. How many adults are praying for young people by name?
- 9. What kinds of rituals recognize the milestones in the lives of youth and families?
- 10. Do adults in our congregation intentionally model high moral and ethical standards?
- 11. Are programs planned and evaluated on the basis of their encouragement to build relationships?
- 12. Are programs planned and scheduled for the convenience of families?

These questions are a good place to start and you may think of others on your own as you begin to figure out the real role of youth ministry in our congregation.

There are basically 4 ways to make youth ministry integral to the life of our congregation:

1. <u>Building relationships with healthy, caring</u> adults:

Mission projects or trips, Servant events, prayer partners, learn their names, greet them, smile, and talk to them. Ask them about their faith journeys, and share yours with them. Be honest, open and caring to our young people.

2. <u>Provide structured and formal learning</u> opportunities:

Provide some intergenerational opportunities for learning, invite youth to be involved in planning, plan for classes to meet specific needs of parents, invite youth and adults to co-lead programs and classes.

3. Provide peer support:

Budget for youth and family ministry as a priority; provide quality space for young people, encourage the youth to participate in the congregation as a group as well as individually, hire quality staff and volunteers, encourage and teach evangelism among young people.

4. <u>Support the families of young people</u>:

Provide parenting classes and support groups, develop relationships among families, plan family-friendly worship services, ask families what they need or want from the church, inform youth and families of where they can seek help or counseling.

Remember what Jesus said, "It's all about relationships...love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength and love your neighbor as yourself. That's what I believe and that's what we should teach by our words and our actions. It takes the investment of the whole faith community to help our young people to know that we treasure the great gift God has given us in them. I'm "All in." How bout you?

Annual Toy Drive for Edgemont Elementary School

There are 850 students (boys and girls between Kindergarten and 5^{th} grade) who attend Edgemont Elementary School - and we would like to provide each of them with a gift for Christmas again this year.



We are looking for toys that keep the kids active or stimulate thinking and creativity. Some suggestions are: basketballs, soccer balls, footballs, skateboards, board games, trucks, and cars. Toys need to be at least \$10.00 in value each. There are some great toy sales going on, so you can get some great deals! **We ask that no used toys, no stuffed animals, no war toys, nor toys needing batteries be given.**

Uniform Drive for Edgemont Elementary continues

We are continuing the uniform drive for Edgemont Elementary (K-5). This is the most economically challenged area in Moreno Valley, where 100% of the students qualify for free breakfast and lunch. Although school uniforms are no longer mandatory, a uniform is provided for children who come to school dressed inappropriately. The cost is approximately \$15.00 for a two piece uniform. We have raised \$1,415.00 so far. God bless you for Also, white socks and your generosity. underwear (size 6 or larger) are continually needed and we will be collecting those items throughout the year.
