

Funny, we can't do without when it came to God's portion of all He gives us, and yet we quickly reset our priorities when it comes to our precious gasoline. In retrospect, I find the new cost of things to be a blessing, ultimately. It's easier, you see, for me to count my blessings when I can realize I can do without many of them without changing much about my life. Oh sure, not everyone is in that position, and for that my heart aches. (I would guess, however, that the number of those is much smaller than we are led to believe.) But learning to do with less is a lesson in Global Stewardship we could all learn from.

To be sure, the demand for good ministry is only going to increase with this new economy that lies before us. Those who cannot let go of the "stuff" they crave will have a great need for the fellowship and compassion of the believers. Pastor Shane will have his work cut out for him as people teeter on the edge of their "budget." How are you going to handle it?

My guess is some have already cut back on their giving to the Ministry. Unfortunately, that will ultimately hurt you more than it does the church – see Malachi (it's short, the last book of


the OT, a quick read – and right to the point.) The point is this; God blesses those who obey Him.

So how DO we survive the new economy? I think we need just to evaluate how much we have so that we can get a feel for the excess that we enjoy. Then, having done that, we can make some good choices for life, which will enable us to help our fellow man, serve our community, and provide a healthy place for our neighbor to grow in the knowledge and promise of the Christ. We'll do that through prayer, worship, and study of His Word. Scripture is full of examples of how people thrived when they learned to manage with what they had. On the flip side, it is full of examples of the hardship people face when they lust for stuff, power, attention, etc.

Now is the time for us to make sure our offerings to the work of ministry don't take a back seat to the price at the pump. When we talk about our giving "first to God", we mean it. You see, the blessing of the tithe will be more and more evident during this "crunch" time. But don't take my word for it – talk to the tithers; they will affirm this message.

The choice is always yours – the pump or the pulpit? Which one fills you up more?
